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

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

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Our monuments will host the Olympic Torch Relay


This year, 2024, the French Centre des monuments nationaux proudly announces that several of its monuments will play a role in the Olympic and Paralympic Games. Beginning 8 May 2024, 23 monuments will appear along the routes of the Olympic and Paralympic Torch Relays.

The Olympic Torch will be lit in Olympia, Greece, on 16 April 2024, according to the ancient tradition. After a 12-day relay through Greece, then a passage across the Mediterranean Sea aboard the famous three-masted ship *Belem*, the Torch will officially arrive in France on 8 May 2024, heralding the return of the Olympic Games after 100 years of waiting. With a route set by the Paris 2024 Organising Committee, the Olympic Torch Relay will be a one-of-a-kind event that will showcase 21 monuments of the Centre des monuments nationaux across France. Through these 21 sites, the Olympic Torch Relay will highlight the beauty and diversity of the CMN's monuments and will offer the public opportunities to discover cultural sites imbued with local flavour.



Route of the Paralympic Torch Relay


For their 17th edition, the Paralympic Games will take place over 12 days, from 28 August to 8 September 2024. Bringing together 4,400 competitors and over 3 million spectators, they will showcase exceptional athletes through not only competitions, but also cultural and artistic performances.

After arriving on the French coast in the city of Calais, the Paralympic Torch will be divided into 12 flames to travel all across France. The 12 flames will symbolise the energy of the 12 days that will make up the first Summer Paralympic Games to be hosted in France: the day of the cauldron lighting on 28 August 2024 and the 11 days of competition.

These flames will illuminate certain sites of the Centre des monuments nationaux, namely:

The CMN, a key player in the Cultural Olympiad

The Cultural Olympiad is an interdisciplinary arts and culture programme that will run until September 2024 across France. France's Regional Offices for Cultural Affairs (DRACs) are helping develop the programme, providing grants to project organisers who will bring "art and sport" into dialogue and showcase the values of the Olympic Movement. The Organising Committee of the Paris 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games is overseeing the development of the cultural programme, with assistance from France's Ministry of Culture and its offices across the country's various regions.

In collaboration with local and regional authorities and with promoters of culture, the DRACs are helping build this programme, which will bring art and sport into dialogue with one another to reflect the vitality of artistic creation and to showcase the wealth of our cultural heritage through inclusive and interactive artistic works presented all over France for as broad an audience as possible.

The Cultural Olympiad is an official designation awarded by the Organising Committee of the Paris 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

The Centre des monuments nationaux is a partner of the Cultural Olympiad and has planned a sports programme to be presented at its monuments. It will be a marathon of events across France, with exhibitions focussing on sport, dance and art performances, contemporary creations and sports work shops.

The programmes at the following monuments have received official Cultural Olympiad designation:

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Art installations Flux Marins by Miguel Chevalier

8 May - 30 September 2024

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Miguel Chevalier is the creator behind *Flux Marins*, an artistic piece to be projected onto the exterior walls of the Château d'If lighthouse, the oldest royal fortification on the islands just off the coast from Marseille.

A pioneer of digital art, Chevalier will bring his virtual world to life with a highly visual, monumental work of art that will be visible from both near and far.

Flux Marins evokes the contours of a landscape, or topographical maps of the seafloor. This piece invites viewers to dream of exploring new worlds.

In addition to the monumental projection, within the castle's cells, Chevalier will present a "cabinet of curiosities," as well as a digital projection on the same theme, offering audiences an immersive experience.






Electronic music and dance performance

8 and 9 May 2024; Duration: 1 hr 15 min Music by Rone (music recorded for the event) With the Ballet National de Marseille

The Château d'If is an emblematic fortress, sitting on the horizon of Marseille's harbour, that symbolizes both imprisonment and the possibility of escape. In this performance, the choreography melds with the clamour of the electronic music to tell a story of the suffering and righteous anger of current generations coming together to find meaning in communities of celebration and of collective struggle. This performance aims to be a wake-up call, a call to action brought on by the overwhelming vision of collapse communicated by the physical connections between the dancers and the energy they project.

Dance performance Passage of the Olympic Torch at Mont-Saint-Michel

La tentative du ciel by Compagnie Hors Surface, Damien Droin

31 May 2024

Presentation of a circus/dance performance, in fixed locations and travelling across the site from 10 a.m. to midnight

Directed by choreographer Damien Droin and performed by students from the ENACR circus arts academy, *La tentative du ciel* (French for "reaching for the heavens") presents an age-old, intimate and collective dream. To conquer the heavens has a different meaning for everyone, whether it be to take flight or to oneself up. Although the myth of lcarus warns us against pursuing this wild dream, the Greeks cultivated the idea of transcending the self in order to reach the realm of the gods, Olympus. This quest is embodied by the Olympic and Paralymp ic Games, which bring together the gods of sport—athletes who put all of their physical and mental strength into achieving great feats and pursuing victory.


La tentative du *iel* draws inspiration from sport to develop different metaphors for these quests for greatness. The great physical efforts and feats of the performers gradually break away from the codes and rules of competition to deliver an expression of freedom. In this performance, a series of movements telling a story of ascension are organised into different tableaux.

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The Ancient Greeks chose neutral, sacred ground, the sanctuaries of Olympia at the foot of Mount Kronos, as a place for athletes to demonstrate their physical provess. Echoing that choice, Mont-Saint-Michel is an emblematic site in France that invites one and all to reach for the heavens thanks to its topography and its history of connecting people with the sacred. The company's artistic performance will travel around to visit audiences in different locations, starting from La Caserne and making its way across the bridge and to the island. The route covers several kilometres and offers a progression towards a poetic expression of a physical feat, at all times crossed with the grace of a torch which, like the sword of Saint Michael, will project a beam of light up to the heavens. Athletes and circus performers will meld their movements with the landscape using equipment hidden in the natural environment, giving their feats a touch of the supernatural. As the performers draw closer to the island, the tableaux will take on more developed form, with equipment allowing the artists to climb to new heights in different ways: a grand staircase taking them up to the infinity of space, long, invisible walls on which they will climb, poles and trampolines that will allow them to soar above the world.







Nighttime performance Signes de Crêtes, L'Atelier des franchissements and La cour des lumières by Compagnie Retouramont

16 May 2024

The vertical dance company Retouramont will take over the fortress of Carcassonne and accompany the Olympic Torch on its visit to the monument.

This event, welcoming all people, will combine contemplative moments with audience participation: equipment will raise dancers and visitors over the impenetrable ramparts of the city. New passages through the air and never-before-seen views will transform their perceptions of the site.

After the lighting of the Olympic cauldron, an evening performance will keep the magic going as the Olympic spirit unites with the vertical dance of Retouramont.

The day of activities will include three different elements, each allowing audiences to see Carcassonne in a whole new light:

- *Signes de Crêtes*: a travelling dance performance along the route of the Olympic Torch.
- L'Atelier des franchissements: a zip line will transport audience members across the castle's ramparts.
- *La Cour des Lumières*: a nocturnal immersive performance within the walls of the Château Comtal (Count's Château).

The 20 dancers and other performers will hang their equipment from the plane trees. The artists' actions will produce monumental shadows onto the tall walls, alongside states video images. Spectators will find themselves immersed in this augmented choreo which will completely change the way they view the site.

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
Danser l'avenir

Dance performance Château de Vincennes 08 June 2024

This event of the Cultural Olympiad aims to draw around 1,800 people from rural and disadvantaged areas of France to participate in the Olympic movement through an artistic performance combining dance, horses belonging to the Cadre Noir de Saumur, and a symphony orchestra, during the passage of the Torch of Culture.

For the event, the Château de Vincennes will host in its court of honour a dance performance by 2,024 public-school students from the suburbs of Paris. This contemporary performance is the result of artistic, cultural and sporting collaboration between the Orchestre National d'Île de France, the Musée de Cluny, the Garde Républicaine, the instructors of the Cadre Noir de Saumur, and the association Danser l'Avenir, along with public-school students from the Académie de Créteil.

The artistic piece draws inspiration from *The Lady and the Unicom*, the famous tapestry woven in 1500 and on display at the Musée de Cluny, considered to be one of the greatest masterpieces of Western art. To accompany the choreography, the Orchestre National d'Île-de-France will perform Arnold Schoenberg's *Transfigured Night* in a version for a full string orchestra.



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Circus arts performance by Compagnie Fratellini (Ecole Supérieure des Arts du Cirque)

Basilica Cathedral of Saint-Denis 29 June 2024

To celebrate the passage of the Olympic Torch, the Basilica Cathedral of Saint-Denis will present a circus arts performance by the Académie Fratellini. Two students of the École Supérieure des Arts du Cirque will perform in the basilica's nave, with their aerial rope and balancing act entering into dialogue with the majestic space and the monument's architecture.

The intimate performance will be followed outside in the square in front of the basilica by a totally different artistic show: a dance and acrobatics performance by the dance company MazelFreten, accompanied by 10 first-year students of the circus arts school. This urban hip-hop electro dance performance will spread its joyful energy to the audience, with all of the generosity of the circus performers and young dancers of MazelFreten.

Additionally, during Académie Fratellini's visit to Saint-Denis, an introduction to circus arts will be offered to youth from Aubervilliers in conjunction with Compagnie Basinga, creating a link with the performance at the basilica.

Paralympic History: From integration in sport to social inclusion (1848-2024)

From 11 June to 29 September 2024

First appearing in the mid-20th century, the "Paralympic" Games have come a long way in a short period of time. How do can we explain this success? To answer that question, this exhibition explores two areas of transformation that have marked the history of the Paralympic movement: the gradual diversification of the disabilities of the athletes involved and the evolution of the discourse and meaning attached to the competitions organised and presented.


The exhibition will be organised chronologically, highlighting four major moments in history:

- The "Stoke Mandeville Games" at Stoke Mandeville Hospital in the United Kingdom, with which Dr Ludwig Guttman started the Paralympic movement with an innovative experiment to promote sport as a form of rehabilitation (1948-1960).
- The first Paralympic Games in Rome, in 1960, which were reserved for people with spinal cord injuries. After this, the Paralympics gradually began adding the official participation of other people with disabilities: amputees, then the blind and vision-impaired. Finally, in 1989, the International Paralympic Committee (IPC) was founded.
- This started a third period in the history of the Paralympics, that of a new Paralympic movement that opened the door to deaf athletes and athletes with intellectual disabilities. At the same time, the movement also saw the rise of new ways of thinking about Paralympic athletes, along with new Paralympic figures embodying those ideas, such as the "Paralympic cyborg" (or the "supercrip") and the "fake Paralympian."

The London 2012 Paralympic Games was a turning point, with the Paralympics becoming a large-scale event for inclusion and pride, marking the start of a new era in which the media seized on the Paralympic Games to present athletic performances like people had never seen before.







Exhibition The Olympic Movement, the French Language and Francophone Cultures

Cité Internationale de la Langue Française -Château de Villers-Cotterêts From June to September 2024

The Centre des monuments nationaux and the Cité Internationale de la Langue Française proudly present a travelling exhibition entitled "The Olympic Movement, the French Language and Francophone Cultures," in partnership with the Musée National du Sport, CREPS Reims Sport and the Alliance Française (CAVILAM Vichy). The exhibition will take place on the ground of the château, in the Service Courtyard. It aims to promote the French language, France's intangible sports heritage and the humanistic values embodied by sport and the richness of the French language.

Tour de France 2024

Amaury Sport Organisation (A.S.O.), a subsidiary of the Amaury media group, organises world-class international sporting events each year. Across Amaury's 40 events, totalling 250 days of competition per year, A.S.O. also incorporates a dimension of social responsibility, which takes the form of initiatives relating to the environment, safety and solidarity.

As partners on the Tour de France since 2013, the Centre des monuments nationaux and A.S.O. work together each year to combine sport with culture. As it makes its way across France, the Tour de France exposes its passionate viewers to some of the emblematic monuments in the CMN's network. Additionally, the backdrop to the legendary finish of the cyclists on the Avenue des Champs-Elysées is an iconic CMN monument: the Arc de Triomphe.

What's more, the CMN aims to guarantee that its monuments will be welcoming to tourists travelling by bike along France's cycling routes by offering special services and equipment adapted to their needs. Cyclists can identify these bike-friendly sites thanks to the posting of their "Accueil vélo" certification. Thanks to the support of A.S.O., the CMN has already equipped the Ensérune archaeological site and museum (34) with bicycle stands, and plans to install them at the Cité internationale de la langue française, the Château de Villers-Cotterêts (02) and the Château de Pierrefonds (60). Les Sports en France de l'Antiquité à nos jours Une histoire, un patrimoine

Sport in France from antiquity to present day: a book from *Editions du Patrimoine*

From the everyday to the elite, from amateurs to professionals, sport has marked and transformed society. It has led to the creation of unique spaces for training, socialising, distinguishing oneself, recreation and more. This book offers a history of the various equipment designed for individual and team sports and how they've been introduced and evolved over time. Covering topics from physical well-being to physical and civic education, from major competitions to entertainment, and not to forget the rise of leisure activities, this volume shows how sport has gradually taken on an important role in French society. It also describes the emergence of forms of architecture with which we are all now familiar (e.g. gymnasiums, swimming pools and stadiums). Designed at all different scales and found all over France, the architecture of sport, ranging from the ordinary to the extraordinary, now represents a remarkable body of public assets. The five parts of the book trace the history in chronological order, covering cultural, political, technical and aesthetic aspects. Pieces focussing on particular points deepen the analysis, while each chapter offers a study of a selection of buildings chosen for their patrimonial or architectural value. This book has been published with support from the French Ministry of Culture's Division for heritage and architecture.

Authors

Franck Delorme is an architect by training, with a doctorate in art history, as well as a historian of architecture and associate curator at the Cité de l'Architecture et du Patrimoine, where he is in charge of the preservation of architects' archives.





Journey through stones and light, photographs by the artist Ahmet Ertuğ

Conciergerie (Paris), from 9 February to 20 May 2024

From Saint Sophia in Istanbul to Saint Peter's in the Vatican, Ahmet Ertuğ travels the world in search of the finest examples of ancient architecture, Roman, Byzantine, Ottoman or Christian,

Byzantine, Ottoman and Christian architecture that illustrate the three principles established by the theorist Vitruvius: durability (firmitas), utility (utilitas) and beauty (venustas).

Using large-format cameras and negatives (20x25 cm), long-exposure techniques, and drawing on the expertise of his architectural eye

Ahmet Ertuğ's photographs capture what makes architecture monumental, and what contributes to the spirit of the place in the smallest detail.

For this exhibition at the Conciergerie, the choice fell on shots of French and Italian monuments.





Love for the Renaissance: A dialogue between collections

Hôtel de la Marine (Paris), from 6 March to 30 June 2024

As part of its programme, <u>The Al Thani Collection</u> at the Hotel de la Marine offers two temporary exhibitions per year. This year, one of them will be *Le Goût de la Renaissance. Un dialogue entre collections* (Love for the Renaissance: A dialogue between collections).

The second of three exhibitions organised in collaboration with the <u>Victoria and Albert Museum</u>, the programme pays tribute to the exceptional inventiveness and virtuosity of Renaissance art. It also examines the fascination that the art movement has inspired in collectors for centuries.

Bringing together **masterpieces from the Victoria and Albert Museum and from the Al Thani Collection**, the exhibition sheds light on the connections across the Renaissance era, an age where exploration and discovery encouraged the exchange of materials and ideas across Europe and with far-flung places. For the first time since the Al Thani Collection opened, the works presented in its four galleries will be entirely updated.

As **ideas and aesthetics inherited from antiquity** drew renewed interest during the Renaissance, rich patrons commissioned **major works of art**, which have since been prized by history's greatest collectors.

Bringing together **over 130 works**, the exhibition puts on display sculptures, works of goldsmithery, jewellery, glass works, textiles, books, manuscripts, paintings, drawings and exotic objects which, for many of them, have never been shown in Paris.

These include works from Antico, Lucas Cranach the Younger, François Clouet, Vittore Crivelli, Donatello, Nicholas Hilliard, Hans Holbein the Younger and Leonardo da Vinci, along with exceptional artistic pieces commissioned from the most talented artists of the period by patrons from royal families and the upper echelons of the aristocracy.

Villa Kérylos (Nice), Spring 2024

From 28 April to 22 September 2024, Villa Kérylos will host an exhibition dedicated to the works of the artist Arman. Complementing the permanent collections, works of visual art, including sculptures of bronze and resin, from one of the greatest representatives of the École de Nice will be on display and shown in a whole new light. The nostalgia found in the sculptor's works will be juxtaposed with the spirit of the Villa, which is itself steeped in the tragic history of the Reinach family. The many references to antiquity, revisited by both the artist and the designers of Villa Kérylos, will also underscore the real modernity of Villa Kérylos.

Fabrice Hyber Villa Cavrois


Villa Cavrois (Croix/Lille), Spring – Summer 2024

After installing his "green men" in the fountain at Paris' Palais Royal to celebrate the thirtieth anniversary of his "Homme de Bessines," artist Fabrice Hyber is now taking over the reflecting pool at Villa Cavrois. For the occasion, the artist will present several other works at the monument.

A player in the international art scene for two decades now, Fabrice Hyber produces his works through accumulation, proliferation and hybridisation, and constantly transitions between the disciplines of drawing, painting, sculpture, installations and video, as well as business and commerce.

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Château d'Oiron (Nouvelle-Aquitaine), Summer 2024

For several years now, the CMN has been working on a project to collaborate with abstract artist Sean Scully, in dialogue with Jill Silverman and the Kewenig art gallery.

After visits to Paris' Conciergerie and Palais Royal, the Château d'Oiron was finally selected to host the project, which will have two components:


- a temporary exhibition of drawings and
- the creation of a permanent sculpture.

Irish-American artist Sean Scully (born 1945) is one of the most significant representatives of abstract art. Strongly inspired by the works of Mark Rothko, Sean Scully has created a visual language compartmented into solid, coloured rectangles. In painting, he superimposes different tones, particularly browns, blacks and reds, using a broad brush. He creates monumental sculptures formed with prisms made of blocks of stone, weathering steel or salvaged materials. Today, his works are on display at over 80 museums and public spaces around the world.

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Honouring Benin at the Conciergerie and Hôtel de la Marine (Paris)

In autumn 2024, two major exhibitions focussing on Benin will be held in Paris.

An exhibition at the <u>Conciergerie</u> will bring together around **40 living artists** and around 100 works, spanning painting, sculpture, drawing, photo, video, installations, performance, fashion design and more.

At the <u>Hôtel de la Marine</u>, the Al Thani Collection will host an exhibition on the theme of the **royal arts of the Kingdom of Dahomey** (the former kingdom corresponding to the modern-day geographical area of the Republic of Benin), which will bring together around 70 works.

The interment of Missak Manouchian at the Panthéon

During a commemorative ceremony on 18 June, the French President announced that in 2024, Missak Manouchian will be inducted into the Panthéon along with his wife, Mélinée. He will be buried in the Panthéon alongside his wife Mélinée at a solemn tribute to mark the 80th anniversary of his execution on Mont-Valérien, on 21 February 2024. They will join other great figures of the Resistance, such as Pierre Brossolette, Geneviève de Gaulle-Anthonioz, Germaine Tillion and Jean Zay.

A survivor of the Armenian genocide, Manouchian arrived in France in 1925. He was a poet and Resistance fighter, leading the group known as the Francs-Tireurs et Partisans – Mains d'œuvre immigrée (FTP – MOI) in the Paris region. Arrested on 16 November 1943, he was executed on 21 February 1944 at Mont-Valérien along with 21 members of his group. An inscription will pay tribute to all 23 members of the group executed in 1944 after the "Affiche Rouge" trial, as well as to the military leader of the Paris FTP, Joseph Epstein.

Château de Vincennes, from 25 April to 9 July 2024

A trusted confidant of the young Louis XIV, and one of the great figures of 17th-century France, d'Artagnan spent many periods at the Château de Vincennes. On the initiative of Pascal Monnet, the monument's administrator, under the curatorship of Jacqueline Queneau, a historian of the arts of the table, and David Brouzet, a professor at the IESA Arts et Culture, accompanied by the historian and costume designer Nathalie Harran, the exhibition "A la table des trois mousquetaires" (At the table of the three musketeers) presents from 25 April to 9 July 2024 in the Sainte-Chapelle of the Château de Vincennes, the century of the musketeers, from the tavern to the Grand Couvert du roi.

A song that reflects who we are: global successes of popular French music

The first major temporary exhibition of the Cité Internationale de la Langue Française

For its first temporary exhibition, **A song that reflects who we are: global successes of popular French music,** starting in the month of May, the Cité Internationale de la Langue Française will shine a spotlight on song—or rather, the way in which Francophone popular music has made its way around the world. From *La Vie en rose* by Édith Piaf to *Pookie* by Aya Nakamura, from the song of revolution *La Marseillaise*, appropriated by a thousand rebellions, to the worldwide craze for the zouk music of Kassav', the values, sentiments, seduction and ideals conveyed by songs create a mythology that will be explored for the first time by a French cultural institution.

The Summit of the Francophone World

The Summit of the Francophone World will begin on 4 October 2024 at the Cité Internationale de la Langue Française in Villers-Cotterêts, a space entirely dedicated to the French language and Francophone cultures which was inaugurated on 30 October 2023 by French President Emmanuel Macron. The Summit will continue in Paris on 5 October 2024.

The 19th Summit of the Francophone World will be a major event for diplomacy, politics, economics and culture, with the French language tying it all together. It will be one of the biggest international events of 2024 to be held in France, along with the Olympic and Paralympic Games.

France and the OIF share the ambition of fostering a Francophone world that serves its peoples while shedding light on the dynamics and opportunities of that world.

France and the OIF have agreed that creativity, innovation and entrepreneurship across the diverse Francophone world will be positioned at the heart of the event. Indeed, the Francophone world is an outstanding generator of intellectual debate, creation and jobs, and it also produces talent and opportunities we should be proud of. The theme of the Summit invites one and all to "Create, Innovate and Foster an Entrepreneurial Spirit in French.".

To illustrate this theme, alongside the Summit, France will be holding a Festival of the Francophone World to promote a dynamic *Francophonie* to the people of France and the rest of the Francophone community. The Festival, developed in collaboration with the OIF, its member states and civil society, will help develop the perception of a Francophone world that's open, lively, multilingual, modern, necessary and attractive. It will underscore the vitality of Francophone culture, academia, science and entrepreneurship and will reach out to all of continental France, the country's overseas departments and territories, online communities and the entire Francophone world.

The Centre des monuments nationaux and the Centre national du costume et de la scène are joining forces to present an exceptional exhibition at the Château d'Azay-le-Rideau in the summer of 2024.

In the Renaissance château, whose facades are reflected in the water mirrors installed in the 19th century, Delphine Pinasa, director of the CNCS, will display around fifteen stage costumes created for mythical figures associated with the theme of water and nature, such as Ondine and Isoline.

These costumes, worn by the great performers of Swan Lake and Zoroaster, will take their place in the flats of the 16th and 17th centuries.



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Introduction of augmented reality tablets at Mont-Saint-Michel Abbey and the Château de Vincennes

As a new year begins, at the Château de Vincennes, the public will get to discover two new visitor circuits using tablets (equipped with a headset for adults). The tablet will become the primary visitor resource to guide visitors as they explore, providing information on the remarkable elements and enhancing the visit with a well-paced and well-rounded narrative of the different visitor areas, from the esplanade leading to the châtelet and the Sainte-Chapelle, the wall walk, the keep and more. Visitors will be immersed in another era thanks to images and 3D reconstructions accompanied by short explanatory texts.

The first circuit is designed for adults in an individual visit format. Even so, the equipment ensures natural and smooth communication between members of a visitor group.

The second circuit has been designed for families or groups of adults and children and allows adults to accompany young children on their visit and offer help if needed.

In early February 2024, Mont-Saint-Michel Abbey will introduce a new visual and audio tool: a tablet and headset that creates an immersive experience. It is aimed at a broad audience and covers 3 different visitor circuits: A 45-minute tour for those in a hurry, a tour lasting an hour and a half for inquisitive visitors, and a fun tour for children. The latter features three characters: a keeper of the keys who crosses all eras, Pierre the pilgrim child and Brother François the monk, both born in the Middle Ages.

The Incubateur du Patrimoine enters its 6th season

Following in the footsteps of the 2022-2023 season, this year, the CMN will support innovative projects that promote **social inclusion** and **environmental responsibility** in the areas of heritage sites, culture and tourism.

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
The reopening of Notre Dame Cathedral

Reopening of the towers of Notre Dame Cathedral

Month after month, Notre Dame is being brought back to life! In December 2023, a new rooster with phoenix wings was installed at the top of the spire, marking a key milestone in the reconstruction project.

The cathedral is set to reopen on 8 December 2024. The Centre des monuments nationaux will be reopening the towers of Notre-Dame cathedral in Paris to visitors.



In summer 2024, the majestic ramparts of the <u>citadel of</u> <u>Carcassonne</u> opened fully to the public for the first time: come stroll along them and enjoy a unique panorama of the Pyrenees Mountains and Aude River.





Opening of the Treasury of Chartres Cathedral

In 2024, after a major renovation project, the Centre des Monuments Nationaux, along with the Centre-Val de Loire Regional Office for Cultural Affairs (DRAC), will be opening to the public the Treasury of Chartres Cathedral. Holding a collection of exceptional objects, such as works of goldsmithery and precious textiles, the Treasury will be installed in the Chapel of Saint Piat, which will be fully open to the public for the first time. To protect the treasury and properly showcase it, installations meeting the conservation requirements of the works were created.

With the over seven-year-long project coming to a close, the Chapel of Saint Piat is ready to serve as the home for the Treasury of Chartres Cathedral. With the chapel fully open to the public for the first time, visitors will have the opportunity to explore the space, covering over 250 m² and spanning two floors. The chapel's restoration included the interiors and medieval stained-glass windows of the upper chapel, as well as the creation of four new contemporary stained-glass windows for the chapter house. The restoration project also included the architectural ambition to incorporate contemporary elements into the historic monument. With that aim in mind, South Korean artist Bang Hai Ja was commissioned to create four contemporary stained-glass windows to replace the lattice windows of the chapel's chapter house.

The Treasury of Chartres Cathedral is a collection of extraordinary objects, chief among them the relic of the Veil of Mary. The collection includes pieces of goldsmithery and textiles. Historically, pieces of the Treasury have been moved, stolen, destroyed, seized and even burnt. Today, the Treasury is largely a rebuilt collection made up of a few historic pieces, along with later acquisitions, notably thanks to a number of items commissioned during the era of the Bourbon Restoration. Some of the most notable works in the collection that visitors will have a chance to admire include the Tabernacle of Saint Aignan, the armour of a royal child and the wampum belt, made from beads of shell and glass, given as a gift from the Huron people, a Native American nation, in the 17th century.

The Château of Pierrefonds gets a makeover


The restoration of the Château of Pierrefonds' Preuses (Valiant Ladies) wing is coming to an end

In 2024, the biggest restoration project carried out at the <u>Château of</u> <u>Pierrefonds</u> in the past 150 years will be completed.

The façades and roofing of the Preuses wing, the Alexander tower and the Godefroy de Bouillon tower are currently undergoing a major restoration.

The Salle des Preuses (Hall of the Valiant Ladies), the castle's masterpiece, has been closed to the public since the work started in 2022. Very soon, you will be able to admire the painted interiors, which have been cleaned and had previous modifications removed, for a final result that's more harmonious and closer to the original appearance.







Rediscover the Bishop's Chamber at the Château of Carrouges

The Bishop's Chamber, one of the main attractions of the Château of Carrouges, in north-west France, reopened in spring 2023 after a major restoration project.

This very extraordinary suite dating back to the 17th century is made up of an antechamber, a chambre de parade for receiving guests, an oratory and a gilded study with woodwork and exceptional painted décor.







'Monument jeu d'enfant'

Saturday 19 and Sunday 20 October 2024, children aged 5 to 12 can embark on a discovery of France's most prestigious monuments. Abbeys, châteaux, palaces and archaeological sites will be transformed into a **playground** for one special weekend.

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


